Download the Reading Rights report which calls on national and local leaders to come together to make reading a part of daily life for every child. The report shares five focus areas that will turn the tide on "indefensible" reading inequality.



<u>Children's Reading: how do we move from Endurance to Enjoyment?</u> This paper from Farshore shows that children need a lot of help, both at home and at school, to get a reading habit and that reading aloud very effectively encourages children to read independently through positive associations and no pressure.

<u>Developing reading for pleasure in multilingual learners</u> Jenny Kilsby, from a large multicultural British curriculum school in Dubai, shares how she encouraged multi-lingual book talk in her new-to-English pupils, helping her to find out about, and build on, their reading interests.

<u>Magazine Engagement Study summary</u> new research highlights the power of magazines to engage reluctant readers. Findings from the What on Earth! Magazine Engagement Study reveal that regular access to high-quality, non-fiction magazines can boost reading enjoyment and positively shift reader identity among reluctant Year 5 pupils.

Book Awards and shortlists

Information Book Award: Announcing the 2025 Longlist - Registrations for the IBA Book Club have now opened and the longlist of titles has been announced. There are 34 outstanding titles within three age categories.

<u>Shortlist 2025 – The Klaus Flugge Prize | Official Website</u> - The shortlist of three debut picture book illustrators have very different styles and subject matter but share exceptional ability to tell a story and to create mood and character.

<u>Books Are My Bag - Shortlist 2025</u> - These awards are curated exclusively by independent bookshops and there are four categories to choose from: Fiction, Non-Fiction, Children's Fiction and Picture Book.

<u>The Little Rebels Award 2025 Longlist</u> Founded in 2010 this award is designed to recognise the rich tradition of radical publishing for children aged 0 -12, in the UK. While the genrespanning submissions touched on social justice issues in a variety of ways, the 13 longlisted titles are those where the radical content formed the very bones of the story.

<u>Young Quills shortlist for 2025</u> – Run by the Historical Association this award is for historical fiction published in the preceding year and in four age categories from 5-8 to 14+. Copies of the books are sent out to a number of schools where pupils read and review them to guide the shortlisting process. Some of the young people's reviews will be made available on the website. Winners will be announced in July.
